Introduction:

An International Webinar entitled *Darkness Visible: Explorations on Disease, Pandemic and Redemption* was organized collaboratively by the Departments of English, Sanskrit, History and Philosophy of Sri Ramkrishna Sarada Vidyamahapitha under the aegis of Internal Quality Assurance Cell, SRS Vidyamahapitha on 16th to 17th July 2021. An organizing committee, consisting of 14 members was formed with Dr Mousumi Ghosh, Principal as the Chief Patron and Mr Subham Amin as the Convenor.

Registration:

The Organizing Committee has published a flyer of the Webinar with registration details and circulated it in academic groups and other virtual platforms such as Facebook, WhatsApp and college website. The registration was done via google form and more than one hundred participants have registered for the Webinar.

Detailed Report of the Proceedings:

Inaugural Session:

The Webinar consisted of four sessions preceded by the inaugural session and followed by the valedictory session. The programme began at 10:30 am on 16 July with *Mangalacharan*, prayer by Dr Sumanapal Bhikkhu, Guest Faculty, Department of Languages, University of Calcutta. Sri Jagabandhu Ghosh, President, Governing Body of Sri Ramkrishna Sarada Vidyamahapitha addressed the Webinar and wished success of this academic endeavour. In her welcome address, Dr Mousumi Ghosh, Principal of the institution has provided the prologue of the Webinar. She has spoken about the relevance of organizing such Webinar in the milieu of the worldwide pandemic. Mr Subham Amin, Convenor of the Webinar welcomed the honourable guests and the audience. Mr Tanmoy Pandit, Coordinator, IQAC has conveyed his best wishes for the success of the endeavour.

Session I:

The Session I was entitled as Implications of *Pandemic on Global Society* and consisted of two speakers: Dr Shubhamitra Das, Assistant Professor, Centre for Indo-Pacific Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi and Mr. G.S Charith Priyadarshana, Lecturer,

Department of Religious Studies and Comparative Philosophy, Faculty of Buddhist Studies, Buddhist and Pali University of Sri Lanka, Sri Lanka. The session began at 11 am.

In her presentation, Dr Das has spoken about the 'Implications of Pandemic on International Relations'. She has given a brief overview of the shifting terrains of the global politics, interrelations between states, the threats of growing militarization and rise of unitary policies and far-right ideology. She has also spoken about the Indian scenario and the shifting paradigms of politics in South Asia and the SAARC region.

Mr Charith Priyadarshana has given an account of Buddhist rituals and practices to redeem the world from the curse of the pandemic. He has also spoken about the importance of *Vipasana* meditation and the ways to maintain mental equilibrium during the periods of lockdown. The presentations were followed by a lively interactive session with the audience.

Session II:

Session II was entitled as *Ideas of Sanitation and Public Health in Sanskrit Literature*. It began at 2 pm. The session consisted of two presentations by Dr Didhiti Biswas, Professor (Retired), Department of Sanskrit, University of Calcutta, Kolkata and Dr B. K. Swain, Professor and Head, Department of Sanskrit (Retired), Sri Jagannath Sanskrit University, Puri. Dr Rubel Pal, Assistant Professor and Head, Department of Sanskrit, SRS Vidyamahapitha moderated the session.

In her presentation entitled *Diseases and an Approach to their Healings: An Overview from the Vedas*, Dr Biswas has given accounts from *Vedas* about the medicines and rituals of treating different diseases and healing wounds.

Dr Swain has talked about *Dosha: Theory and Pandemic: An Overview from the Smruti Shastra and Ayurveda.* His presentation comprised concepts of Dosha and the loss of equilibrium in body and its consequences and ways of healing. The presentations were followed by a lively interactive session with the audience.

Session III:

Session III began at 11 am on 17 July 2021. This session was entitled *Morality and Mental Health in pandemic* and consisted of two presentations by Dr Laxmikanta Padhi, Associate Professor, Department of Philosophy, University of North Bengal and Dr Somdeb Mitra, Assistant Professor, Department of Psychology, University of Calcutta. Mrs Bhaswati Basu, Assistant Professor and Head, Department of Philosophy, SRS Vidyamahapitha moderated the session. The session began with greetings from Dr Mahitosh Gayen, Assistant Professor, Department of History, City College, Kolkata and member of the Governing Body, SRS Vidyamahapitha.

Dr Padhi has delivered a comparative study of the concepts of morality in Indian and Western concepts.

Dr Mitra has talked about the problem of depression because of home isolation due to lockdown during pandemic. He talked about the problems of communication in a virtual classroom and suggested remedies to overcome the crisis.

The presentations were followed by a lively interactive session with the audience.

Session IV:

Session IV was entitled *Pantheon of gods and goddesses of disease and pandemic in Indian tradition* and consisted of two presentations by Professor Arabinda Samanta, Retired Professor and Head, Department of History, University of Burdwan and Mr Pema Wangchuk, Lecturer and Dean of Academic Affairs, College of Language and Culture Studies, Taktse, Trongsa, Bhutan. The session began at 2 pm. Mr Saumya Bose, Assistant Professor, Department of History, SRS Vidyamahapitha moderated the session.

In his presentation entitled *Revisiting Smallpox Epidemics and the Cult of Sitala in Colonial Bengal*, Professor Samanta spoke about the colonial policy of vaccination of smallpox in Bengal in the colonial era and the responses of the two religious communities to the policy. He also talked about the worship of the Goddess Sitala as part of the belief that the Goddess would cure the deadly smallpox.

Mr Pema Wangchuk spoke about the Buddhist Gods and Goddesses of the pandemic. He talked about Avalokitesvara, Hariti, Mahamayuri and other Buddhist Gods and Goddesses of healing. He also provided a brief overview of the healing rituals in India, Bhutan and Tibet.

The presentations were followed by a lively interactive session with the audience.
