Her husband is a short stature, exhausted failure, a feminist of her opponent, disabled and unable to hold his family together and Malika resolves to take prostitution as a means and survive the rest of family members when all the doors to find a suitable job are closed and she is able to resist her son and family when it stands on the brink of starvation and thereafter death. She aggravates her maternal instincts by denying her constant humiliation by choosing prostitution as a way to save her family from drowning and destruction. She thwarts Pramatha's plan to exploit her and leaves to strangle Pramatha to death. Malika is a figure of courage in her final misfortunes bringing an apt closure to the tale of victims by spiteful, strong-hearted, justful racketeer. Her bravery in the face of difficulties wins the hearts of readers as she stays undaunted by the final catastrophe and reaches the final solution through her strong will and presence of mind. In her vengeful action lies her courage to question the dominant forces of the society. She blurts out in rage:

on her case of being a mother, she never gives up forgetting of the self. yet, she never gives up when she is overwhelmed by anxiety and anguish on the end, she makes full control over the inner struggle and the outer struggle.

The story shows women's response to the cataclysmic episode of partition. Sometimes with their wilful amnesia of the violation, the appropriation of male role as breadwinners, as anchor to the family in the state of utter helplessness, transgression to sustain their family from the state of abject poverty and adopting changing gender role and attributes as they flaunt courage, practicality and patient in the extremely intolerant times.

Malika who doesn't give up in the face of misfortunes, turns to be a heroic figure in the end though she is faced with violence by devilish capitalist forces of hell bent to dispossess and degrade her identity. The final act of her revenge should be seen as the possible alternative to the disorder in the absence of the normal moral or social order. The ending evokes a sense of shock and bewilderment but has a plausible justification. In the end, her peaceful and calm reply puts to rest all misgivings about the appropriateness of her conduct.
